

Weekly Market Review

June 06, 2024

Overview

Corn is the item of the week out of the south with plenty of yellow and bi color corn, and the quality is outstanding! South Georgia production continues to increase on several items; however, squash will remain the shortest due to weather related pressure. We expect to see tight markets in the region and on the west coast for the next ten days. Hot peppers remain very short with tomatillos, shishitos and serranos all being the most volatile for the next several weeks. Tomato markets have calmed down a bit with stable supply on both coasts and new crop out of the California desert on mature greens have ramped up and normal crossings from Baja keep a good balance in supply and demand. Steady supply crossing in Otay and Mcallen and Florida spring production is steady this week on rounds and snacking tomatoes while romas will be short this week. Table grapes are finally easing back as more production becomes available out of Mexico. We should see domestic fruit next month. The offshore melon season is done, and we have transitioned to the desert where supply is lighter this week but anticipate better supply next week. With U.S. avocado standing inventories down and handlers needing to refill the pipeline, demand for fruit in the field has spiked. Field pricing is being pushed up, and several market adjustments to higher levels will be made over the next couple of weeks. All four COOs currently in play have size curves favoring smaller fruit, giving Mexico leverage as the predominant source for 48s and larger. The rainy season in Mexico has not started yet, and if drought conditions continue, we can expect to see erratic crop cycles into the 2024-25 season. Peru arrivals will become significant over the next two weeks, further relieving the pressure to increase volumes out of Mexico and hopefully bring back market stability towards the end of June. Some regions, mainly where French beans are grown, have started to see rain that has affected production. The weather in the Salinas Valley continues to hold acreage back and the industry continues to harvest early to meet demand which is reflected in the limited supplies. Ground temperatures are below normal, and crops are just not growing. As a result, we still have extreme markets on most commodities and unfortunately it seems that this weather trend will be following us into June.

Fruits & Vegetables

Avocados: ESCALATED Last week's harvest closed at 53.9M pounds, which is almost no change from the previous week. Harvest for this week is tracking at a similar pace, and Mexico's lighter volumes are easily being accounted for from the other 3 COOs currently on the market. Markets across all sizes saw an increase and will likely continue until the end of June. Mexico's normal crop continues to mature, and dry matter is averaging 37.3%. Ripe cycles are shorter, and fruit is at a peak eating experience.

Bananas: Lighter supply and higher demand have tightened up inventories at many ports this week. Quality remains good.

Pineapples: Quality is good, with steady supply on smaller fruit, however larger sized fruit is expected to be a challenge through the entire summer.

Table Grapes: Good supply and quality out of Mexico. There are deals being made on the last of the offshore fruit on inventory, but quality is less than fair. We expect to see some fruit out of the desert anytime soon.

Berries

Strawberries: Supplies remain steady and are expected to remain steady for the foreseeable future. Over the past week, weather conditions in Watsonville/Salinas and Santa Maria areas have been consistently overcast, with occasional sun in the afternoons. Temperatures have been cool, causing a dip in production. However, both regions warmed up this week, leading to an increase in production. Fruit size and quality have been generally good, but some issues like misshapen fruit and low rates of pin rot have been observed. Labor concerns have not been reported.

Blackberries: Quality is good, with sizing between the medium to large range, a nice sheen, mostly black, and good firmness. Due to high temps in the Mexico regions, growers see some regression in some ranches and softer fruit as the days get hotter. Volume has been dipping due to the heat and will be limited for a while until another minor peak comes again towards mid-June. Flowers have started to bloom in the Watsonville region, and growers should start to see the harvest of small scratch picks beginning at the end of this week.

Raspberries: Mexico is experiencing hot and sunny weather with cooler mornings. Production has decreased due to the recent hot weeks, resulting in frequent rejections by the QC team. The fruit quality is good, with a strong red color, but some fruit is lighter due to early picking. Sizes are mostly medium with some larger berries and counts range from 35-52. There are occasional overripe and crumbled fruit in the packs, but efforts are being made to remove them. Production in Watsonville has begun and will double weekly until the peak in early August. All Mexico transfers are directed to New West Cooling in Watsonville.

Blueberries: Blueberries are experiencing issues with shriveling, scarring, and deformities due to high heat, leading to decreased production out of Mexico. Volume will decrease in late June through July, with a ramp-up towards September. Organic volume is tapering off and will end by the end of June. Out of the Central Valley, both conventional and organic production have peaked and will decrease over the next couple of weeks. Quality is good, with some soft fruit and red backs being managed effectively by the packing house. Conventional blues will peak in mid-June. The Florida season has finished. Georgia production is tapering off, with one more big week expected before ending towards the end of June.

California Citrus

Oranges: EXTREME ON MEDIUM AND SMALL SIZES No Changes this week on the orange crop from California. The Valencia season is underway, as the Navel season continues to wind down. There are small sizes available now, but as we get through June and into July, small size oranges will become increasingly harder to get. Flexibility on sizing and loading areas will be mandatory in order to get orders filled!

Lemons: EXTREME ON SMALL SIZES- We continue to see small Lemons in California exceptionally short with no relief in sight until District 3 fruit gets started late in the summer. Import Lemons are starting to arrive in a small way with small fruit available. Flexibility on sizing and loading areas will be mandatory in order to get orders filled on orders loading in California!

Limes: ESCALATED ON LARGE SIZES Lime market is steady on medium and small sizes as we see volume from Mexico still running heavy to the smaller sizes (200's and 230's). Large sizes remain in extremely short supply.

Grapefruit: California Grapefruit is being packed in Riverside and the central valley.

Imports/Specialties: Cara Cara's are wrapping up for the season. Domestic mandarins and Gold Nugget mandarins are available. Pummelos are available in the Central Valley of California. Volume on import lemons is increasing.

West Coast Lettuce

Iceberg: ESCALATED Lettuce supplies continue to be light due to cooler temperatures. Quality is very good, but with slightly smaller heads and weights. The market is active with elevated prices due to overall light supplies industry-wide and the forecast is for steady prices at current levels. Warmer temps are in the forecast for the end of this week and into next week which should increase supplies.

Romaine, & Romaine Hearts: ESCALATED Romaine and romaine heart production is steady, and the current quality is good. Markets and demand remain strong.

Green Leaf and Red Leaf: Production in the Salinas Valley is steady. Overall quality is good, and current markets remain strong with good demand. Prices are no longer escalated.

Butter: Production in Salinas Valley is steady. Overall quality is good.

Eastern and Western Vegetables

Green Bell Pepper: Good supply available across all sizes and Quality is good out of all locations.

Color Bell Pepper: Excellent supply and good quality available on all sizes.

Mini Sweet Pepper: Supply will be hit and miss this week loading in Nogales.

Mixed Chili Pepper: EXTREME Record low supplies and higher demand is pushing prices higher across the entire category. Overall, the quality is fair, but we expect to see a large imbalance in supply over the next 3-5 weeks on items like shishito pepper, serrano and tomatillo. California and the Baja will start in 4 weeks which are expected to bring much needed relief to the entire category.

Eggplant: Quality if good and supply is fair out of South Georgia and Coachella. Expect to see some fruit scratching in the Central Valley this week.

Slicer Cucumbers: Steady supply available out of McAllen, South Georgia, and Florida. Baja is scratching. Overall quality is good.

English Cucumbers: Promotable volume crossing from Mexico; markets were firmer this week due to lighter supply of slicer cucumber. Quality is good.

Pickles: Lighter supply available out of Nogales and Quality is good.

Green Beans: Supply is lighter this week and quality is hit and miss due to weather related pressure. We hope this improves once we move into newer blocks late next week.

French Beans: WATCHLIST Production has slowed down due to rain in the Guatemalan growing regions. This may also affect quality and shelf life. Supplies remain steady out of Mexico, and quality continues to improve.

Zucchini/Yellow Squash: ESCALTED Availability on soft squash has become very short. This is all due to weather-related pressure impacting the current crop in South Georgia, along with Mexico finishing early, and the transition to California very slow to start. We are seeing some pro-rates on our program business with our grower partners and expect this to gradually improve over the next 7 to 10 days.

Herbs

Basil quality continues to improve. We are still seeing few quality issues with dill and oregano, although we have seen improvement. Chervil production is normal.

Melons

Cantaloupe: ESCALATED Very good cantaloupe demand continues with limited production forecasted over the next ten days. We anticipate a decrease in daily pack-outs by the end of this week, which will remain lower through next week. Following our update from the end of last week, there is some optimism that the situation for next week will not be as dire as was first portrayed, but we do expect an approximate 30-40% decrease in overall volume. We are expecting regular volumes to resume at some point during the week of June 10th with sizing likely to turn larger.

The region has started to experience hotter temperatures which is conducive to providing better sizing. We are seeing a few more 9's the past two days, but still too many 12/15's being packed, which is negatively impacting yields. Quality of what we have seen over the first week has been very good with strong netting, good color and solid internal quality with brix levels now maintaining a 12-15% range.

Honeydew: New production will begin later this week. As with the cantaloupe, we are expecting primarily smaller sizing (6/8s) initially until we get a good week into production. Flexibility of sizing may be required at time of loading. Mexican honeydew crossings on larger fruit (5/6s) basically ceased last Tuesday which has pushed their market to higher levels as the market they were experiencing was not sustainable.

Watermelon: Good supply available as new crop is being harvested out of North and Central Florida as well as Mexico. Overall, the quality is good.

Mixed Vegetables

Artichokes: ESCALATED Overall supplies are still light. Quality is good.

Arugula: Supplies are good, quality continues to improve with the warmer weather.

Asparagus: ESCALATED Obregon/Southern Baja production has improved as has sizing. Peruvian weather has started to turn cooler, which has led to slow production. Washington, Michigan, and Canadian production continue to increase this week. All markets are very heavy on standard-size asparagus. Markets have slowed down due to the Peruvian vessel delay and the Memorial Day holiday this past weekend. White asparagus remains very limited to non-existent from Peru, likely until July.

Bok Choy: ESCALATED Supplies are improving, and quality is good. The market is active.

Broccoli/Broccoli Crowns: ESCALATED Salinas broccoli volumes are moderate, look for FOBs to hold steady or markets to firm up. Demand is also steady, and quality is excellent.

Broccolini and Sweet Baby Broccoli: Salinas is showing good quality and supplies are steady.

Brussels Sprouts: Sprout demand remains good, but open market pricing is slowly advancing. Supplies for the VA category may see some shortages driven by quality issues. Insect damage is becoming more significant and elongated seed stem remains a challenge.

Carrots: (JUMBOS, MEDIUMS and CELLOS): WATCHLIST Steady supplies continue with good Quality. Shippers still have light volume out of California, but volume is improving.

Cauliflower: ESCALATED Industry supplies have decreased, and the overall market is significantly stronger. Overall quality is good.

Celery: ESCALATED Supplies are increasing as the Salinas season gets ramped up and overall quality improves. Pricing is still escalated, although the overall market has adjusted slightly. Expect steady supplies for the next couple of weeks.

Cilantro: ESCALATED Cilantro supplies are getting better. We are still seeing some bacterial leaf spotting in the Salinas area, but quality is improving. Mexico supplies are currently good but are expected to get tight once the Salinas supplies get back to normal.

Corn: Good supply and excellent quality out of South Georgia and Coachella with promotable volume available out of South Georgia.

Fennel: Market is steady. Quality and supplies are good.

Garlic: The 2023-2024 California Garlic will come to an end, prior to the new crop being ready for harvest. Look for subs to Mexican product during transition, starting approximately June 1st. Quality is good.

Ginger: Supplies and market are steady

Green Cabbage: Supplies are steady with very good Quality. Demand is good.

Green Onions: We continue to see better supplies out of Mexico, with very good quality.

Mushrooms: Stable supply and good Quality available.

Napa Cabbage: ESCALATED We continue to see some quality issues, but we should see an improvement over the next few weeks. Quality and supplies are improving.

Parsley: ESCALATED (Curly, Italian): Supplies will be limited for the next few weeks, quality is fair.

Rapini: Quality is good, supplies continue light. Market is strong with supplies continuing light through next week.

Red Cabbage: ESCALATED Pricing is escalated. Quality is good although supplies continue to be tight. Market is stronger.

Spinach: Supplies are good, and quality continues to improve with the warmer weather.

Spring Mix: Supplies are good, and quality continues to improve with the warmer weather.

Snow Peas and Sugar Snaps: ESCALATED Markets are still very active on snow peas. Guatemala's production of snow peas remains very low due to the heat and lack of rain. Sugar snap production is back to normal. Out of the west, snow peas are in a supply gap; expect limited supply for the next few weeks. The sugar snap supply is steady.

Onions: **ESCALATED**

Red onions remain extremely short, leading to higher market prices. We are optimistic that May will bring some relief, although significant changes may not occur until the middle of the month. With low inventory levels, growers will need to sell their produce at lower prices to reduce the FOB prices. Texas has mostly completed their crop, except for yellow and white onions. New Mexico is expected to join the market towards the end of May, but their production peak is anticipated in June.

Potatoes:

There are no significant changes or obstacles anticipated. The market is projected to remain relatively stable. In May, we anticipate a slight increase in Burbanks and a decrease in Norkotahs. By the end of the month, all growers should have completed harvesting Norkotahs and transitioned exclusively to Burbanks until the new crop of Norkotahs is harvested in August.

Tomatoes: East Coast

- **Round Tomatoes:** Markets remain soft on rounds this week with the spring harvest now in full swing. Quality remains fair at best and peaking on larger sizes. We expect to see more local regions, South Georgia has started followed by South Carolina then Tennessee, Alabama etc.
- **Roma Tomatoes:** Market remains firm despite steady supply. Overall quality is good.
- **Grape Tomatoes:** Excellent supply and quality available
- **Cherry Tomatoes:** Excellent supply and quality available

Tomatoes: Mexico

- **Round Tomatoes:** Good supply and quality available out of Jalisco and Baja.
- **Roma Tomatoes:** Good supply and quality available out of Jalisco and Baja.
- **Grape Tomatoes:** Steady supply and good quality available crossing through McAllen and Nogales.
- **Cherry Tomatoes:** Steady supply and good quality available crossing through McAllen and Nogales.
- **Medley Grape Tomatoes:** Good supply available this week. quality is good.
- **Tomato on the Vine:** Steady volume available this week.

California Tomatoes

- Seeing mature greens out of the desert available this week and Valley fruit should scratch in early June

APPLES

Apples: Washington State Apples remain in good promotable volumes on most varieties. Quality has been very good and is expected to remain good for the foreseeable future. Sizing is trending toward smaller sizes, 100s and smaller. Gala apples are seeing roughly one million fewer packages than last year.

Pears: Availability is down on Anjou and Bartlett is expected to see a rise in markets over the coming weeks.

Other Fruit

- California stone fruit now in production and cherries are winding down and will transition to the PNW.
- Apricots now available
- California table grapes should start in the desert in June.
- Georgia is ramping up in peach production
